#### MAKE YOUR OWN POP-UP LANDSCAPE

Use this fun activity to learn about the foreground, middleground, and background of a landscape! Scan the QR code to watch the instructional video!

- 1. Take a flat piece of paper and fold it into 4 vertical sections using the zig-zag fold method
- 2. Open the paper up to reveal your 4 folded sections. On the left edge of your paper, make a small mark near the top, about an inch or 2 down. Now, on the right edge of your paper, make a mark near the bottom of the paper, about an inch or 2 away.
- 3. Connect these 2 dots with a diagonal, jagged line. This is your mountain range! Cut along this line to create your landscape. You should now have a foreground, a midground, and a background when you fold your paper back together
- 4. Color each section. Add grass, trees, bushes, rocks, whatever you want on your landscape!
- 5. Once you're done coloring, flip your folded paper over and put some glue on the backside. Glue this to a new sheet of paper. This will be your background.
- 6.Decorate your background with clouds, a sun, whatever you wish. Optionally, you can also cut out small, medium, and large houses to place within your landscape to show depth. Happy making!
